# Seasons of the Church

"Liturgy" comes from the Greek word meaning, "Work of the people." Being a member of Holy Trinity Lutheran, you might understand the idea that worship requires you to work. Liturgical churches are pretty participatory: we are always standing up, sitting down, or kneeling; the congregation prays together out loud; everyone comes up to the front to receive communion.

Silverio Gonzalez is a staff writer at Core Christianity. His blog declares his love of liturgical Protestant worship, in-part, because it includes lots of Scripture reading throughout the service. He says,

Usually there are readings from the Old and New Testaments, Psalms, Epistles, and Gospels. Sometimes the Psalms are sung. Protestant liturgies include a variety of arrangements and a number of Scripture readings. Hearing so much Scripture read in church is like being washed in God's Word.

The church calendar and the lectionary are part of a liturgical church. They help us keep our worship focused on God's word and provide variety and depth to our services. Check our the summary of the association of lectionary and seasons on page 2.

### SEASONS OF THE CHURCH (CONTINUED)

What's a Lectionary? "Lectionary" is a church's pre-assigned set of scripture readings for each season. The use of scheduled readings can be traced back to the early church and seems to have been inherited from Judaism. Denominations have adopted different lectionaries but Lutherans generally use a 3 year cycle (Year A, Year B, Year C). For the 2019-20 calendar, we are in **Year A**.

There are some special days that have become part of the cycle too.

Advent

November 28, 2019 –
 December 23, 2019

**THEMES** 

Waiting; Expectation; Hope; Yearning; Need for a Savior, Joy; "Coming" of the Messiah. Hope for the Messiah's second advent.

Christmas

 December 24, 2019 – January 5, 2020 Celebration of the Incarnation of the Word of God; Salvation; Joy; Kingdom; Peace; Giving.

Epiphany

Ordinary

January 6, 2020 –
 February 25, 2020

Ordinary time is not "plain, boring time," but rather "counted" time. Themes include the basic elements of the Christian life.

Transfiguration

Time

Lent

February 26, 2019 –
 March 8, 2020

Penitence; Morality; Human Limitations; Need for a Savior; Self-Denial; Preparation for Good Friday and Easter. Some traditions emphasize Lenten fasting - others focus on adding spiritual disciplines.

3 Days

March 9, 2020 –
 April 11, 2020

The death of Jesus and its meaning; Love for one another (Maundy Thursday). Palm Sunday celebrates Jesus as king, but leads into a solemn preparation for remembrance of his death.

Easter

April 12, 2020 –
 May 31, 2020

Salvation; Victory; New life; Joy; Christ reigns.

Pentecost

Trinity Sunday

Reformation

Christ the King

Ordinary Time April 13, 2020 –
 November 25, 2020

Ordinary time again. HTLC breaks into this season with celebration days like Trinity Sunday, Christ the King Sunday, and All Saints Day. Watch for white and red paraments and perhaps gold communion ware used on these special days.

# MESSAGE FROM PASTOR DOANE

You have heard me preach enough to know that I love history. Maybe you wish I didn't love history so much because you have to listen to me preach. George Santayana, a philosopher, essayist, poet and novelist at the turn the 19<sup>th</sup> to the 20<sup>th</sup> Century is famous for saying or writing,

"Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it."

I think that is true, but it isn't why I love history. I love history because it paves the way for insight and understanding. When you read this article we will be in the second or third week of the Sunday School Class I'm teaching, "The New Testament You Never Knew." It is the premise of the two writers, N.T. Wright and Michael F. Bird that the only way you can understand the New Testament is to know the history behind it. Just so you know, I'm having a grand old time teaching this class. I sure hope you can find the time to join us. It is not too late.

In worship the last few weeks we have been reading about John the Baptist. It is said there hadn't been a prophetic voice in Israel for 400+ years. Into the Judean wilderness comes John the Baptist. The

people came out in large numbers to hear John preach and to be baptized by him. John said he baptized with water, but one was coming after him who would baptize with the Holy Spirit and fire. He, of course, means Jesus. I think we under-estimate the harshness of John's message. He preached "Repent, the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand." (Matthew 3:2) The people who heard him must have believed him because many were baptized by him in the Jordan River. On the other hand, Jewish leaders from Jerusalem didn't believe him because he embarrassed them in front of the crowds, calling them "a brood of vipers" or "snakes in the grass". But it was his criticism of an affair between Herod Antipas and Herodias, the wife of his brother, Philip that got him arrested". They openly lived together which according to Jewish Law was adultery. Herod had John arrested and John was eventually beheaded.

That sets the stage for the beginning of Jesus' ministry. Basically, we all know what happened next. But there may be more to it than meets the eye. What don't we know?



- Ask our Father for what we need;
- seek His guidance,
- knock on the door of the Father's house so the it is opened to hear our deepest desire and become in alignment with God's will.

We were invited three times – how many more were required before we accepted the invitation?

Even better than the invitations is the recognition of the promises:

- (1) "and it will be given,"
- (2) "and you will find,"
- (3) "it will be opened to you."

There are four more promises. Did you notice them?

It is so encouraging to witness how strongly the Holy Spirit is working in our congregation. Your faithful contributions and service are a testament.

In April, I suggested that God was up to something.

Bishop Bill has been quoting Isaiah 43: 18 – 19 for six years!

"Do not call to mind the former things; pay no attention to the things of old. Behold, I am about to do something new; even now it is coming. Do you not see it? Indeed, I will make a way in the wilderness and streams in the desert."

Somebodies ARE praying! I know that because that is what you tell me. It is not in vain.

Thank you for exhibiting patience and grace to all in this place where we gather to worship and support.

Be encouraged! Pray often and with confidence.





# A Devotion for Our Day based on a reading from 1 Corinthians

A group of quilters gathers around a piece of cloth. It is the genesis of an act of love that, when completed and given away, will change a life for the better. Among the craftspeople are differing political opinions, theological viewpoints, and ways of looking at the world. But they are united by baptism into Christ, and in that communion they are unified by Jesus' love. And it is a love that makes all the difference in the world.

Paul addresses the dark clouds of division that threaten the church in Corinth. He reminds his audience to look at the bigger picture. What matters most is their unity in Christ and their common, shared identity as baptized and beloved children of God. Paul's words can also shine some light for us today, reminding us of to whom we belong, in whom we are unified, and through whom we are blessed to bless others.

Lord Jesus Christ, keep us united in you, and in our communion help us to share your love. Amen.

# 1 Corinthians 1:10-21 The Message (MSG)

I have a serious concern to bring up with you, my friends, using the authority of Jesus, our Master. I'll put it as urgently as I can: You must get along with each other. You must learn to be considerate of one another, cultivating a life in common.

I bring this up because some from Chloe's family brought a most disturbing report to my attention—that you're fighting among yourselves! I'll tell you exactly what I was told: You're all picking sides, going around saying, "I'm on Paul's side," or "I'm for Apollos," or "Peter is my man," or "I'm in the Messiah group."

I ask you, "Has the Messiah been chopped up in little pieces so we can each have a relic all our own? Was Paul crucified for you? Was a single one of you baptized in Paul's name?" I was not involved with any of your baptisms—except for Crispus and Gaius—and on getting this report, I'm sure glad I wasn't. At least no one can go around saying he was baptized in my name. (Come to think of it, I also baptized Stephanas's family, but as far as I can recall, that's it.)

God didn't send me out to collect a following for myself, but to preach the Message of what he has done, collecting a following for him. And he didn't send me to do it with a lot of fancy rhetoric of my own, lest the powerful action at the center—Christ on the Cross—be trivialized into mere words.

The Message that points to Christ on the Cross seems like sheer silliness to those hellbent on destruction, but for those on the way of salvation it makes perfect sense. This is the way God **works**, and most powerfully as it turns out. It's written,

I'll turn conventional wisdom on its head, I'll expose so-called experts as crackpots.

So where can you find someone truly wise, truly educated, truly intelligent in this day and age? Hasn't God exposed it all as pretentious nonsense? Since the world in all its fancy wisdom never had a clue when it came to knowing God, God in his wisdom took delight in using what the world considered dumb—preaching, of all things!—to bring those who trust him into the way of salvation.

Nearly 200 volunteers were packing away hunger at Christ United Methodist Church on Monday. Nineteen member of HTLC joined the effort.



In the winter when darkness begins to surround us around 5pm, we're more aware of the lighting in the HTLC parking lot. We're fortunate to have a bit of technology in place to help us out of the dark.

When the parking lot plan was designed, consideration was given to a number of factors including safety and security, operational costs, and courtesy to our neighbors. Flooding the entire area with light from sunset to sunrise not only uses more electricity than can be justified, it can disrupt the peaceful sleep of families in homes nestled up against our property lines.

The solution was to provide a baseline level of night-time light with an option to add more for church members to turn on when the building is in use during the evening hours.

- Automatic timers turn on a specified set of lights each evening.
- Additional lights can be activated by using a timer located in the chapel next to the front entrance.

If you are hosting an event or meeting that runs past twilight, you are welcome to stop in the chapel to fully light the parking lot for your event. The timer offers the opportunity to turn on the auxiliary lights for 2 to 12 hours.

What more info? Ask a member of the property committee to show you how to use the timer feature.
